GOVERNING BODY CERTIFICATION OF THE ANNUAL AUDIT
Form of Resolution

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:5-4 requires the governing body of every local unit to have made an annual audit of its books, accounts and financial transactions, and

WHEREAS, the Annual Report of Audit for the year 2010 has been filed by a Registered Municipal Account with the Municipal Clerk pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:5-6, and a copy has been received by each member of the governing body; and

WHEREAS, R.S.52:27BB-34 authorizes the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey to prescribe reports

pertaining to the local fiscal affairs; and

WHEREAS, the Local Finance Board has promulgated N.J.A.C. 5:30-6-5, a regulation requiring that the governing body of each municipality shall, by resolution, certify to the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey that all members of the governing body have reviewed, as a minimum, the sections of the annual audit entitled "Comments and Recommendations; and

WHEREAS, the members of the governing body have personally reviewed, as a minimum, the Annual Report of Audit, and specifically the sections of the Annual Audit entitled "Comments and Recommendations, as evidenced by the group affidavit form of the governing body attached hereto; and

WHEREAS, such resolution of certification shall be adopted by the Governing Body no later than forty-five days after the receipt of the annual audit, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:30-6-5; and

WHEREAS, all members of the governing body have received and have familiarized themselves with, at least, the minimum requirements of the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey, as stated aforesaid and have subscribed to the affidavit, as provided by the Local Finance Board; and

WHEREAS, failure to comply with the regulations of the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey may subject the members of the local governing body to the penalty provisions of R.S. 52:27BB-52, to wit:

R.S. 52:27BB-52: A local officer or member of a local governing body who, after a date fixed for compliance, fails or refuses to obey an order of the director (Director of Local Government Services), under the provisions of this Article, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, may be fined not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or imprisoned for not more than one year, or both, in addition shall forfeit his office.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Hamburg, hereby states that it has complied with N.J.A.C. 5:30-6.5 and does hereby submit a certified copy of this resolution and the required affidavit to said Board to show evidence of said compliance.

ENGINEERING:

Mayor Marino gives a brief update regarding the Water Main Project. He was in contact with Debbie Hirt from the State DOT project. We will be doing work on the road for our water main project and we are requesting that we do not do the top coat paving as the DOT will be doing their own project and it will encompass that area. There seems to be a slight miscommunication between the engineer and the DOT. Ms. Hirt advised that it was included in the plan and the engineer advised that it was not. The engineer and DOT will discuss and resolve the matter.

MAYOR'S AGENDA:

1. Recreation Meeting – Hardyston Township

Mayor and Councilmember Krasnomowitz attended a meeting at Hardyston Township regarding the Littell Center and the use of the fields. It was requested that each town get an inventory together of what fields each town has. The scheduling of the fields will be done by one central location and one person from the Littell Center. By doing this it will give each field a down time so there is not over use on them. Councilmember Krasnomowitz discusses what time frames the town wants to have our fields available. The town decides that Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays from 12:00 – 5:00 p.m. The town when giving the list of available fields will also include the field on the Board of Education property. Councilmember Krasnomowitz advises that our soccer and baseball fields are ready to go but that the soccer fields need to get goals.

The next issue discussed is the request for all towns to contribute to the cost of running the Littell Center. Presently all the leagues use the facility at some time but the cost to sustain the building and staff are only from Franklin and Hardyston. Hamburg and Ogdensburg has been asked to contribute. At present approximately 280 children from Hamburg use the facility through sports related functions and this does not include the other uses from Hamburg residents such as boy scouts, girl scouts, senior citizens etc. There was a discussion of cost and with the money available in our own recreation budget the town may contribute \$5,000.00 annually or \$2,500.00 for this year. If there are no contributions from all towns then residents from the towns who do not contribute will have to pay a separate fee to use the facility.

2. Proclamation – Relay for Life of Sussex County

Relay for Life will be held on May 14th at Sussex County Community College from 4:00 pm to 6:00 am. Mayor Marino reads the Proclamation - Relay for Life of Sussex County into the record. Motion by Councilmember Barr, seconded by Councilmember Oehler to adopt. All members present in favor.

COMMITTEE REPORT

COUNCILMAN SENA

1. POLICE COMMISSIONER

Motion by Councilmember Sena, seconded by Councilmember Barr to open the meeting to Police

Director Wayne Yahm

Director Yahm reads the March monthly report into the record. He advises that he has been meeting with the different associations and business in town to introduce himself and to see if there are any issues or concerns they may have. He has met with Heritage Lakes and the Board of Ed Superintendent. He will be meeting with Hamburg Village in the future. He advises that he was approached by the Knights of Columbus to nominate an officer for the annual Shield Award which will be held in Sparta on May 18th. He has nominated Sgt. McNulty for this award. He has also been in communication with Sussex County Community College; they will be doing a magazine article and Patrolman Dan Farrugio will be featured in the article as he was a graduate from the college.

Director Yahm addressed the members on his memo dated March 28, 2012 regarding his research on the video's for the patrol vehicles. The cost for the installation of all hardware, server and cameras for all three vehicles would be \$22,615.00 add to this his proposed map tracking and live view at a cost of \$3,500.00 brings the total cost to \$26,115.00. Director Yahm advises that the prosecutor's office is offering a grant in the amount of \$17,420.00 making the total cost for Hamburg \$8,695.00. This is something that he highly recommends the council consider as it not only is for the safety of the public but also acts as a safety issue for the patrolman on duty. He advises that he is trying to install a "we" mentality in the department, everyone working for the common good and to boost morale.

Councilmember Sena advises that the council was not aware that there was this grant from the prosecutor's office; that is a major factor and a great opportunity for the town to move ahead with the video camera. Director Yahm advises that there are other grants he is looking into and is waiting for more information. He reports that it appears the county is moving ahead with the 911 dispatching and new information will be forth coming. Director Yahm advises that the breathalyzer that was in the police station had not been in working order for 3 years. The police have been using the services of Franklin and Hardyston when it was needed. The problem with the machine was the air flow in the building where it is stored. Vernon Township had the same issue. The machine has been sent out and he hopes to have it up and running by the end of April. Councilmember Sena comments that this is a \$14,000.00 piece of equipment that has been sitting idle.

Police Car – The update on the police car is that Mr. Yahm spoke with the dealership and advised that since the original email communication from the chief was for a white car and a subsequent email after the chief had left from the Sgt. Advised that the car was grey, they should have verified from the town what was wanted. There was an apparent line if miscommunication and he will report back.

2. BOARD OF HEALTH

Councilmember Sena advises that the next Board of Health meeting will be held on Tuesday, April 10th

COUNCILMAN KELLY:**1. BUILDING AND GROUNDS**

Councilman Kelly is working with Mike Schneider in getting quotes for the recreation fields for soccer goals and picnic tables

Councilman Kelly advises that although not on his agenda he was approached last month by some members of save the homestead and they asked that the Mayor and Council consider adopting a

resolution opposing the sale of the Homestead by the freeholders without a public referendum on the matter. This is an institution that has been in the county for 150 years and started with the Yahn family; it is a facility which for many years has housed Medicaid patients and low income patients in the county. Should this facility be privatized those residents may be sent to other facilities outside the county. Presently the ratio is 2/3 residents are Medicaid and 1/3 private insurance. Councilman Kelly discusses that the original plan has since been expanded to include the Yahn which would be used for administrative purposes thereby allowing for more bed space in the facility. Council questions whether there could be a condition on the sale that it is kept as a long term facility with a certain number of Medicaid beds.

COUNCILWOMAN OEHLER:

1. EMS

Councilwoman reported that there were 28 calls for the month of April and 110 calls for the year. In past meetings there were discussions regarding the up charge costs associated with the purchase of new EMS vehicles. The cost increase can be as high as \$35,000.00 to equip a 2013 ambulance and the cost is due to the mandatory front and back air bag requirement. The present rigs that towns have do not need to meet this requirement it is only for 2013 on.

2. RECREATION

Councilwoman Oehler advises that Hamburg Day will be moved from Saturday, June 23rd to Sunday June 24th due to conflicts with the pavilion.

COUNCILMAN LAW:

1. FIRE COMMISSIONER - OEM

Councilman Law reports that there were 15 total calls for the month. 2 assists for EMS, 2 assists for the public, 2 fire alarms, 2 motor vehicle accidents, 1 brush fire and 2 mutual aid calls

2. COURT

The court has begun bringing the prosecutor in on the extra day which worked out extremely well, bringing the cases from 70 to 28 and out of the 28 26 are represented by lawyers

3. RECYCLING AND SANITATION

Final touches are being put on the report and it will be ready for submission at the end of the month

COUNCILMAN KRASNOMOWITZ:

1. CONSTRUCTION

Councilman Krasnomowitz reads into the record the construction reports from February 1, 2012 to February 29, 2012.

2. HOUSING REHABILITATION

Councilman Krasnomowitz reports that everyone has received the letter from the clerk regarding the Housing Rehabilitation Program. Presently there is \$139,794.00 dollars in the account. North Jersey Planning Associates will begin the process to reestablish our existing housing rehabilitation

program. The council agrees that this is a great program that will greatly benefit many residents of the borough. After the initial reestablishment and those funds are exhausted the borough can then decide if they choose to apply for another grant in the future. Clerk will have information put in the upcoming newsletter to make the public aware.

Motion by Councilmember Krasnomowitz, seconded by Councilmember Barr to accept the proposal presented by North Jersey Housing and reestablish this program.

Councilman Krasnomowitz that the next land use board meeting will be Monday and on the agenda is the application for a change to the building for the gas station on route 23.

COUNCILMAN BARR

1. BOARD OF EDUCATION

Councilman Barr reports that he was the only resident to attend the Board of Education budget meeting. There is no school board election this month as they have chosen to go with the general election in November for members. Hamburg like all other schools in the county are considered "High Performing" schools and as such the state is cutting aid in the amount of \$600,000.00 over the next 5 years. The school budget is showing a 1.2% increase which equates to \$12.00 per hundred. This was able to be done without any cuts to the staff or programs.

2. ROAD DEPARTMENT

the Back Hoe specs have gone out to the engineer who will provide the clerk with the bid specs and then they will go out to bid.

A price was received for the chipper through state contract and the cost came back in the amount of \$38,788.50 which is substantially higher than the amount that was budgeted using the savings from the salt budget. Council discusses looking into having bid specs prepared and putting the chipper out to bid.

PUBLIC PORTION:

Motion by Councilmember Law, seconded by Councilmember Barr to open the meeting to the public for any questions or comments they might have with regard to the good and welfare with the Borough.

Sheila Frayko – questions the status of Hamburg Village application before the Land Use Board and is advised that it is carried to the May meeting.

Ron Garrett - advises that it will be the coach's responsibility to rake the fields and home base.

Ray Whitty – "Save the Homestead" thanks the governing body for supporting the resolution. He advises that a hearing will be held on April 16th in Frankford and asks all to attend. There have been discussions on some changes such as making the entire first floor or more for veterans and utilizing the Yahn house on the property for admin. Council discusses how the health care will grow substantially in the next years as the baby boomers are all coming into that age group so facilities like this are needed more than ever.

Chris (unclear) Thanks the Mayor and Council for the support of the Homestead.

public.

Councilmember Kelly advises that with all the recent discussion surrounding confidentiality in the workplace and who should have access to borough facilities it came to discussion to look into cleaning services that are fully bonded and insured. He had several companies come in to give quotes on doing the Borough Hall, Court and Police Station. Two quotes were received and ECO Cleaning Service LLC came in with the lowest quote of \$736.00 per month to include all three areas with the duties as described in the quote. The company is fully bonded and insured with background checks performed on employees. The second vendor was Servpro from Franklin who was \$250.00 a week.

Motion by Councilmember Kelly, seconded by Barr to award the contract to ECO Cleaning Service effective May 1, 2012 for a one year contract Attorney shall prepare contract and include all requirements for insurance and bonding.
